


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A. African economies struggling against wind and tide


- Adverse winds hampering trade between sub-saharan African (SSA) and Asian economies
- Sluggish global growth has triggered off a fall in commodity prices, down 45% in two years.
- Shock to commodity prices has affected exporting countries including Africa.
- Fall in african government spendings.
- Weak outlook in FDI between Asia and Africa




 With an additional 1.3 billion people on the continent by 2050, Africa will account for the highest population growth spurts compared to other continents

Household consumption, accounting for twothirds of GDP on average in sub-saharan African economies, could support growth.



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




