Objective n° 1: Developing and improving services

West Africa


- Deep seated in Africa, CMA CGM Group serves West Africa , East
 Africa and South Africa as well as Indian Ocean
- > CMA CGM Group holds a 23% market share in West Africa
- 1,09 Million TEU static annual capacity is deployed on the Africa
 Lines services with a modern fleet of 130 vessels up to 6,500 TEU
- CMA CGM Group is the first shipping company to deploy 5 700
 Teus vessel in West Africa
- 25 direct services dedicated to Sub Saharan Africa combined with
 a 5 coastal feeder network to sustain the rapid African growth
- > CMA CGM Group serves also secondary ports:
 - O San Pedro
 - o Takoradi
 - o Malabo
 - o Buchanan
 - o Libreville
 - o Port Gentil

Nigeria

- CMA CGM has been present in Nigeria since 2001 and has 131 dedicated staff members with two offices in Apapa and Port Harcourt
- CMA CGM holds a leading position in Nigeria and ranked number

- > 9 Weekly Call per week
- CMA CGM connects Nigeria to Asia, India Middle East and Europe via direct services
- CMA CGM connects Nigeria through its relay services to Latin and North Americas and Oceania
- > CMA CGM calls in the 3 Nigerian Ports:
 - o Apapa
 - O Tincan Lagos
 - o Onne
- > CMA CGM offers 3 direct weekly services from Asia

Objective n° 2: The example of Lekki terminal

Key advantages

- Strategic location in the largest populated country and 2nd largest economy in Africa, with booming local market
- Much-needed terminal in a highly congested port zone with poor productivity for vessels operations
- Modern and deep sea facility, making it a natural transshipment hub for West-African cargo
- Strong governmental support, including direct participation of Nigerian Port Authority
- > Existing access roads with on-going improvement/expansion works

Main features

- > 1.2 km quay, -16m draft
- > 70 ha yard, 16'440 ground slots (238 reefer)
- > 14 Post-Panamax STS, 48 RTGs
- > 18 Gate lanes
- > Dedicated power supply
- State-of-the-art optic fibre connectivity and TOS/TAS
- > 2.5 million TEUs capacity
- > Opening in 2017









Objective n° 2: The example of Lekki terminal

Role of CMA Terminals


- > CMAT Terminals and ICTSI, through their Joint-venture Lekki International Container Terminal Services LFTZ Enterprise (LICTSLE), are in charge of designing, equipping, manning and operating the container terminal for a period of 21 years from operation start
- > The Master concessionaire of Lekki Port zone, LPLE, is to provide the terminal infrastructure and is also responsible for maritime infrastructure, marine services and maintenance dredging
- > Apart from its participation as terminal operator, CMA Terminals will play a particular role in **ensuring full support from CMA CGM lines**, ensuring high filling factor of the terminal from Day 1 of operations

Why is Lekki a strategic investment for CMA CGM Group?


- > Invest in the 1st consumer market in West Africa
- > Increase market access & market share in Nigeria through secured berthing windows and much improved vessels operations
- Increase market access & market share in West Africa by using Lekki as a regional transshipment hub –
 notably enabling the use of larger vessels on main trades
- > Benefit from the financial return of terminal operations

Objective n° 3: Developping and improving Inland Services

DELMAS and **CMA CGM** go beyond sea transportation offering customers a global service which, similar to our maritime services, relies on a global office network at close proximity to their markets

- "Through Bill of Lading" service (TBL), customs clearance, warehousing including inland haulage and Reefer activities (Plugging, Monitoring).
- Tailor-made service to serve land-locked countries through secured transport corridors
- CMA CGM owns 3 off docks in West Africa: 2 in Dakar and 1 in Cameroun (opening in May 2014)
- CMA CGM serves 29 sub-Saharan countries via inland corridors







Objective n° 4: Encouraging development of Port Equipment

Our success depends on investments by Local authorities and governments:


- Deep Sea port of 16m draft
- Berth length of 350 meters each
- Gantries with minimum double lift
- Productivity minimum of 35moves per hour per crane
- 3 cranes / 3 experienced gangs per vessel

- Shore equipment for evacuation (RTGs and Reach Stackers)
- Stacking system in place
- Fixed windows
- Efficient / Fast customs system in place (automatic system)
- Train connection with the terminal for fast evacuation
