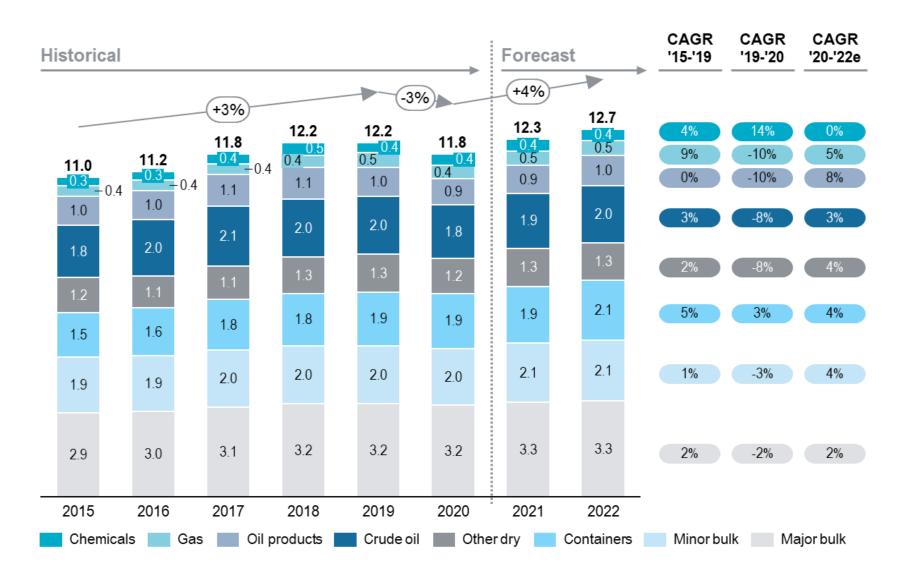

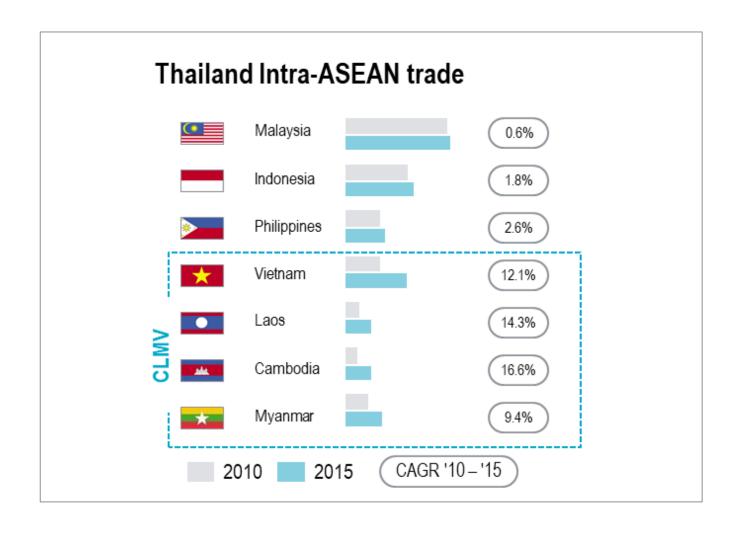


Global maritime trade (bn tons) returning to pre-pandemic levels





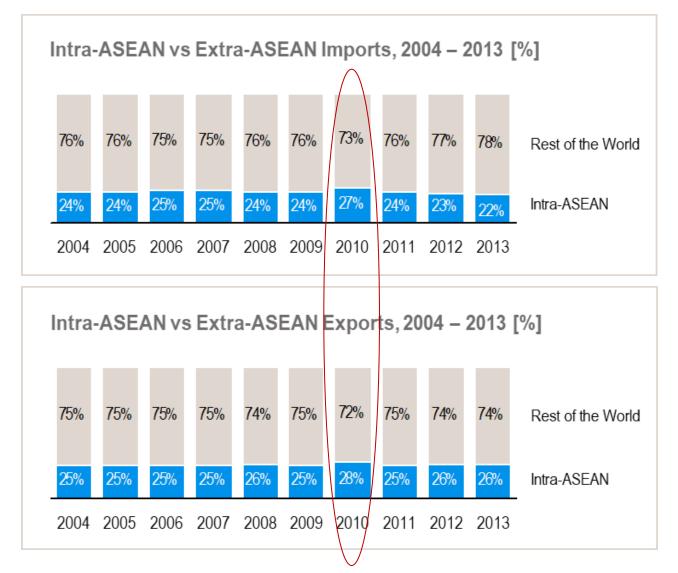
The economic and trade integration of the 5 Indochina countries is increasing rapidly

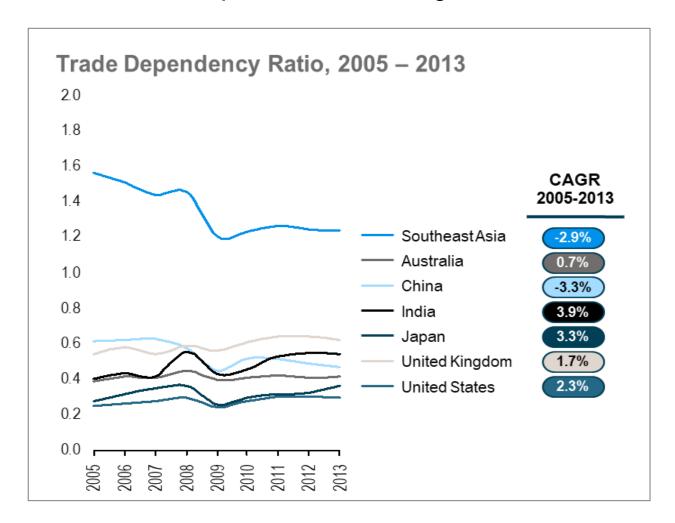
Intra-ASEAN trade is NOT increasing in share

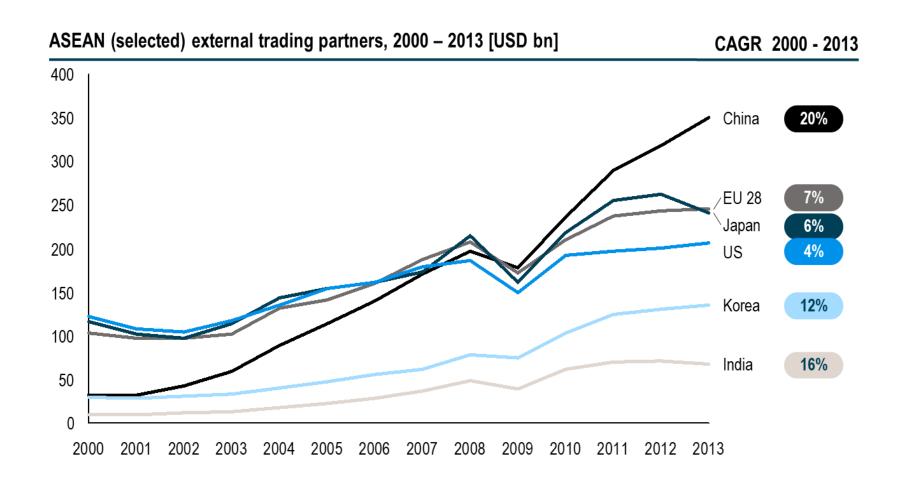
Even so, overall, ASEAN is becoming LESS trade dependent – more self-sufficient - in particular the larger economies

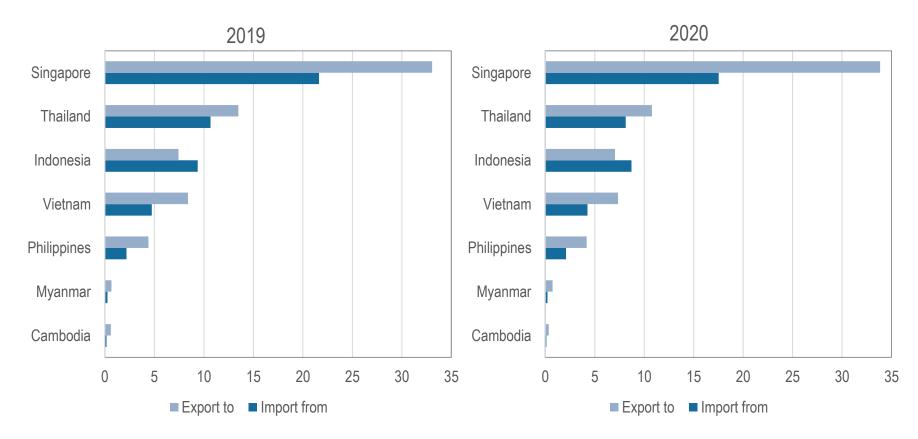
ASEAN's external trade is becoming more regional, less global





In particular, trade with Thailand has decreased strongly during the Covid crisis, as well as imports from Singapore

Malaysia's trade with ASEAN partners (bn USD)

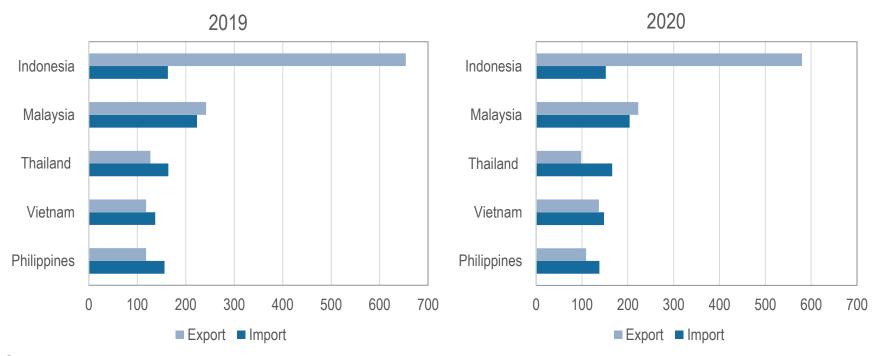

Overall, the Covid impact on the port sector across ASEAN has been negative, but not across the board

ASEAN port throughput (mln tons (FWT))

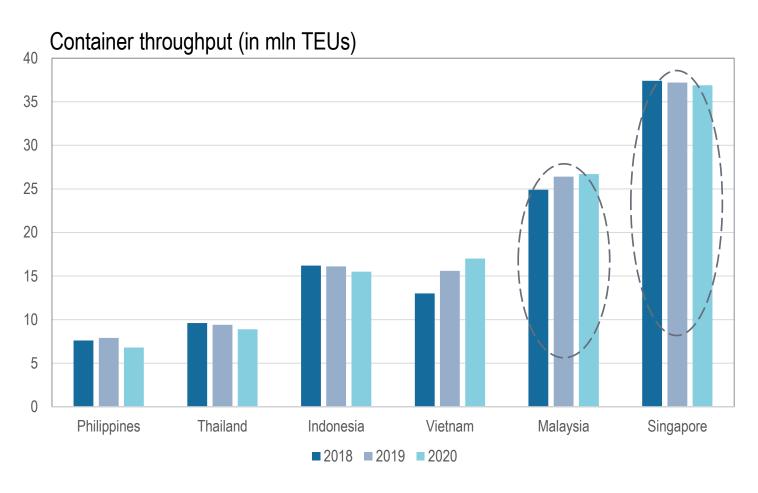


Singapore: Total = 672 mln tons

During the crisis - in the container trade - Malaysia (transhipment) and Vietnam (ExIm) have been the outliers

Outlook for the SEA region, 2022-2030

Only ADB dared to issue a GDP forecast until 2030

- GDP growth outlook: 4-5%
- Maritime trade outlook: ~ 4%
- Transshipment: ~ 4%



Growing our maritime trade with our ASEAN partners

Thailand

- LCP is becoming the premier gateway for Indochina
- Largest trade segments: (fresh) food, electronics, car parts, chemicals
- Strong industrial linkages with Malaysia

Indonesia

- Trade is diverse
- Largest trade segments: oil, chemicals, coal, agro-commodities
- Some industrial linkages, but less extensive than Thailand

Vietnam

- Fast growing economy, consumer sector, trade
- New gateways to Indochina
- Largest trade segments: fresh food/fish, electronics, fuels, cereals

Philippines

- Trade is diverse, but relatively small
- Largest segment: consumer electronics, consumer goods
- Significant part of trade is with Sabah, across the Sulu Sea basin

Eastern Gateway

- Growth of new, national, eastern gateway, around Kuantan
- Integrated coordinated maritime planning for the whole coastal corridor from Pekan to Kerteh

Dry Bulk

- Demand and opportunity for more port capacity, for both ExIm and Transhipment
 - Dirty
 - Clean
